
## New Entrance at ETC Building Offers Increased Safety, Accessibility

The Virginia Department of Transportation is conducting a study of potential improvements along Route 41 (Franklin Turnpike) in Pittsylvania County. This study includes a public meeting Monday, March 25, 5:30 p.m. at the Mt. Hermon Volunteer Fire Department, 4268 Franklin Turnpike.

Interested residents are also invited to fill out a survey about improvements along that corridor.

The study area extends from north of Hunting Hills Road to Orphanage Road and focuses on providing safety enhancements and further bicycle, pedestrian and transit access. Recommendations from this project may be developed into future funding applications for Smart Scale and other funding programs.

New Prospect Baptist Church Recognized for 175th Anniversary



The Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors presented a "Certificate of Recognition" to New Prospect Baptist Church to honor its 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary during its March 19 business meeting. In addition to being recognized by the County, Virginia Delegate Eric Zehr, 51<sup>st</sup> District, and Congressman Bob Good, 5<sup>th</sup> District, also recognized the church with written statements that were presented to church members present. In addition to the recognitions, flags commemorating the church's longevity will be flown in Richmond and Washington, D.C. Those flags will then be presented to the church. New Prospect is located in the Staunton River District.

The Certificate states, "The Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors expresses its sincere congratulations and admiration to New Prospect Baptist Church on its 175 'year anniversary. Formed in 1849, the church was first called Baptist Church of Christ at Mt. Pleasant. The name was then changed to New Prospect Baptist Church in 1874. A devoted member, Mrs. Mary Green, once said that it was a fitting name as there will always be a "new prospect" at the church for as long as the church stands. The church is affiliated with the Staunton River Baptist Association, the Baptist General Association of Virginia, and the Southern Baptist Convention. New Prospect Baptist Church is a memorial to the faithfulness of God and to those who stepped out in faith many years ago. We wish you many more years of growth and blessings as you celebrate your 175-year anniversary."

### **Board Recognizes Tiffany Aherron**



The Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors presented a Certificate of Excellence at its March 19 business meeting to Trinity Aherron, who resides in the Dan River District. ## Chatham Library Gets a Little Help From its Friends









Members of the Chatham High School track team and BETA Club assisted Chatham Library staff on Friday, March 22, to box up books in preparation for new carpet to be installed throughout the library. To aid with the installation, all the books in the library had to be boxed up and moved to a storage area outside, and the shelves will be lifted as the work progresses. It took three days for staff and helpers to box up the books. Once the carpet is in place, the books will be returned. The carpet accompanies other renovations, including two new offices and a larger meeting room. The library is closed while the carpet is being installed with an estimated reopening of April 8.



Pittsylvania County's first responders answered the call to service this week, saving the lives and property of the County's citizens. EMS responders answered 187 primary calls for service between March 14-20. Of those, volunteers responded to 149 of those calls – or 80%. Pittsylvania County Public Safety were the primary responders on 38 of those calls, or 20%, and outside agencies took two.

The County's fire departments responded to 52 fire calls during that same period.
