Supervisors Authorize School Board to Apply for Literary Loan Funds



The Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution authorizing the Pittsylvania County School Board to apply for state Literary Loan funds to be used for school capital improvements.

The authorization, not to exceed an aggregate principal amount of \$26,486,278, was approved at the May 21 Board business meeting and following a public hearing.

Blairs Fire and Rescue Extricates Woman from Collapsed Deck



An evening potting flowers could have taken a tragic turn if it wasn't for the trained response by Blairs Fire and Rescue, who successfully extricated a woman from a collapsed deck.

The incident occurred Wednesday, May 22, at about 7:25 p.m. at the home of John and Sandra Blair on Carson Jones Road.

Sandra said she was sitting on the deck, potting flowers like she does every spring. John arranged the pots around her on the table and had gone into the house when he heard an unusual sound.

Freedom of Choice Committee Recognized



The Freedom of Choice Committee was honored with a resolution adopted by the Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors at its May 21 business meeting. The Committee began its work in October 2021 and is made up partly of alumni from formerly all-black Pittsylvania County public schools during the time prior to and during integration. Other committee members are from the County's library system and Historical Society.

The Committee sought to recognize the students who were part of the Freedom of Choice era and to create an accurate, complete, honest and inclusive account of this time in history. The Committee searched yearbooks to identify the black students who attended the primarily white high schools during the Freedom of Choice era, 1964-1969. The Committee wanted to honor these students who showed remarkable courage, leadership and sacrifice to help break the racial barrier in education.

The Committee worked with support from the County School Board, and in partnership primarily with the County Public Library System and the County Historical Society on the collaborative effort to curate and preserve the interviews and documentation collected about "Freedom of Choice" in the

County; along with digital records, including audio and video recordings of alumni, which are stored and made available to researchers and the public. To commemorate this work, the Committee held four ceremonies in February 2024 to unveil plaques installed at each County high school – Chatham, Gretna, Tunstall and Dan River – which list the names of the black students who attended during the Freedom of Choice era.



The Tunstall High School Trojans volleyball team received a certificate of excellence from the Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors during its May 21 business meeting.

The Lady Trojans had an outstanding season with an overall record of 21-4. They won the Piedmont District regular season and continued to advance and win the Piedmont District Tournament. The Lady Trojans then competed at the next level in the region and were Region 3D tournament semi-finalists.

Tunstall High School Head Coach Paige Echols was also awarded a certificate of excellence from the Board.

Echols was named Piedmont District Coach of the Year in her first year as head coach at Tunstall, and the Lady Trojans had 21 wins under her leadership.

The Lady Trojans won the Piedmont District Regular Season and continued their streak by advancing and winning the Piedmont District Tournament. They then competed at the next level in the Region and were Region 3D Tournament Semifinalists. Survey Addresses Road Safety










Pittsylvania County's first responders answered the call to service this week, saving the lives and property of the County's citizens. EMS responders answered 213 primary calls for service between May 16-22. Of those, volunteers responded to 157 of those calls – or 74%. Pittsylvania County Public Safety were the primary responders on 56 of those calls, or 26%, and outside agencies took nine.

The County's fire departments responded to 49 fire calls during that same period.
